
St Alban's Catholic Primary School Catholic Life Parent Survey June 2023



- We are grateful for the wonderful religious education that our children receive at St Albans.
- It's a little bit extreme.
- I find it terribly sad that, whilst there are clearly opportunities for the school to use OLEM for services, the clergy there appear to have a very hands-off policy in terms of their contribution to the life of the school.
- It would help if the holy communion course would be done at school or after school . I am also not clear on why the school masses are done by the Blackfriars priest and not the OLEM priest.
- I think the school does a great job immersing the kids up in a Catholic lifestyle, but I fear a lot of it is hidden from parents. Maybe a dedicated section in the newsletter specifically on the Catholic/Religious affairs of the school?...
- Generally very pleased, especially with the children writing/learning prayers and the rosary. Notice for school Masses could be better publicized and the children, while well behaved in Mass, do not seem as confident at the order of Mass/responses as expected.
- I chose to send my child to St. Albans because I want them to grow up in a Catholic environment. I think this is the best position for my child and for our family. I am ambivalent about exploring other religions and cultures at this stage. I think it makes sense to focus on inculcating a proper sense of Catholic identity in primary education, for Catholic children. There will be plenty of time to learn about other philosophies when they are older/in their spare time. It is particularly important to me that my children are shielded from the so called "progressive" movement that is very prominent and vocal in our society currently. I think these movements are incredibly damaging to children, certainly abusive and antithetical to the Christian way of life. I would like my children to learn in an environment that is unencumbered by these things and I believe a traditional Catholic environment is the best place for this. More generally, I remain to be convinced that school is the best place to learn about these moral and social issues. I'd rather my children focussed on core academic subjects and left the vogue social issues of certain alternative "lifestyles" to the parents to dissect.
- I believe the school achieves an excellent balance of promoting Catholic values, whilst encouraging an inclusive understanding and appreciation of other faiths, beliefs and cultures, and equipping the children to think independently and develop their own sense of responsibilities and values.
- Q6 Mainly in Y6. Children in other classes are passive bystanders.
- There could be improved relationships between OLEM and the school, particularly around the availability of space for City Kids afterschool club capacity. If i understand correctly that this is the reason for small club capacity.
- There should be school Masses on all Holy Days of Obligation. Meatless Fridays
